

Sadie have been working on the thwarts, finishing off the risers, making up rowlock chocks and making and fitting frames. In the

series of photos here and below some of these activities have been captured. Over left John C is working on one of the thwarts as he glues up a filler piece. Whilst



John is doing that Sadie is busy cutting out some of the rebates that the thwarts will fit in. In the photo above right Whaler John and Anne C are cutting out a damaged section of

one of the frames so that we can fit a new piece in place. There are about twelve or so frames that

will be replaced or repaired during the whole programme. Both of Cyclops's

risers are now complete with the


last section being spiled in by Anne C over left as she makes up the makes up a spiling board to take off the pattern for John P above right to mark up and cut the timber to shape. Following on from last month's frame building in situ this month we used a different method and

made up a series of moulding boards to make up the laminated frames. In the photo over and above left Whaler John, John C and Brian D are doing a mass 'glue up' ready to put the laminations together and cramp them all up. Over right after it has been glued it is being cleaned up and





bevelled by Fay so that it fits the boat. Just think all this work just to produce something that looks like an anorexic anteater bottom left. Then finally, in the photo over right another of the new frames is in place and we are ready to move on to the next. Below you can see a selection of frames made by Tom B, Jim M, Brian E, Janet along with one of the rowlock









chock prototype being used to trial fit Fred's brass inserts and far right Brian D is putting a bevel and bull-nose edge to one of the new thwarts.
